The students had many questions about the rotary dial phone that sits on the Dr. Cox desk. They were very aware of who Bill Gunder was, where he lived and that his ancestors founded The Village of Arcanum.

More about William Ashley, Revolutionary War Veteran

The Lucy Knox DAR Chapter published Patriots in Knox County in 2004. The Chapter graciously shared notes from their book about William Ashley, his family, and son William. In research another DAR member found that William's wife, Phoebe, descended from the Mayflower 7 Jamestown Line families who first came to America. Research since writing the brochure was that Ashley is buried on his son Elisha Ashley's farm. It looks like several other family members were also buried there including wife Phoebe and son-in-law Elias Arnold who married Mary Ann Ashley, William's daughter. The Ashley family came to Ohio in 1816 first settling in Knox Co (Fairfield Co and Mt. Vernon area). From there William moved to Darke County where he died in 1828. A monument is placed in Knox County, which is now Morrow County, in William Ashley's memory for his service to his country. If you are an Ashley family descendant or enjoy revolutionary war patriots we have the rest of the story in our reference library.

Ithaca Cemetery

In preparing the driving tour we learned about others who are buried or may once have had a stone at Ithaca Cemetery. An ancestor of member Bruce Shank, Revolutionary War Veteran Frederick Shank, is buried in Ithaca. Bruce told us Frederick first lived in a log cabin near Grubbs-Rex and Littles Rd. He also had a "summer" home in Arcanum. His son built a home at the end of Albright Road/Grubbs Rex Rd. which was Gale Good's farm at one time. We are hoping to have the rest of the story in our library in the future.

Down Memory Lane Jeannette Brock Burke wrote a small book titled "Down Memory Lane" in which she tells of growing up in Ithaca, the families who lived there and what it was like between 1901 and 1970. Stories of the Wert, Brock, Burke, Baldwin, Unger, Ridenour & Cromwell families are available to read in our library. Look for the binders marked "Ithaca Families" and the book *Down Memory Lane* to learn more about Ithaca. The binders include over 30 letters written in beautiful handwriting as well as photos and newspaper clippings. We are interested to learn about more Ithaca families.

Old Fashioned Days Festival 2015

Riding on the Arcanum Wayne Trail Historical Society float this year were Tom and Liz Stephens with many of their great grandchildren..

AWTHS recognized Stephens Lumber Co., Inc. for their 75 years of business in Arcanum. Tom Stephens is the son of Columbus Isaiah. "C.I.", his brother George J. and C.I.'s sons Jack and Tom operated the saw mill from 1928 until 2003. The mill had been at the same location since George Ivester purchased the land from William Gunder in the mid 1850s and started a saw mill.

Lumber from Stephen's Lumber Company was used in many places throughout the world. A few uses were: planks used in construction of PT boats during WWII; beams and planks to refurbish the USS Constitution for our nation's bicentennial 1976; railroad ties were cut for Disney World; paddles wheel boards for Delta Queen and other riverboats and also wood for area covered bridges.

Richard Rinehart once again pulled the float with his 1948 Ford 8N tractor. Richard's restored tractor always gets a lot of attention. Thanks to all who participated in some way with this year's float.
