Arcanum Times December 4, 1913 Fast Playing by Local Basket Ball Team Pulls in Another Victory

Last Thursday night saw the fastest basket ball game played in Arcanum for a long time when the Arcanum Tigers defeated the Greenville Rexalls, 28 to 23. The local boys played an excellent game and have developed considerable team work. At various times of the game they showed better all-around playing than the visiting team. A large crowd witnessed the game. Fourman center for the Tigers, and Reigle of the Rexalls, were the stars of the game.

Baseball was always a big part of small communities. The first Arcanum Base Ball Club was organized in 1899. No indication as to where the games were played or for how long. In 1912 a company of ten businessmen formed to promote another baseball club for Arcanum. These were considered semi pro teams. Read more in the *Arcanum Chronicles* page 31 and 32.

WILLIAM ASHLEY RE-DEDICATION AND REKINDLED

Second brings me to the inquiry from Find-a-Grave which is a web site to look at cemeteries and burial sites. I was approached about William Ashley, Revolutionary War soldier. Through the inquiry from Vicky Krogg a friendship was built as well as a probe into the assumed burial site. Those of you not familiar with our Historic Self-Guided Driving Tour on Ithaca from several years ago, William Ashley's memorial stone is placed at Ithaca Cemetery and is a designated historic site on the tour. As you read the condensed version in the brochure you will find mention along the route of the "actual burial site" being on Clark Road behind the old two room school house on the hill outside of Ithaca on Rt. 503. This was taken from a web site which list the Ashley Cemetery in this location "behind a two room school house". However, Vicky and myself looked further into the records and believe this may be in error. In a Bible record and letter from the Burton Ashley family dated 1906 we read "Died in Darke Co. Ohio December 28, 1828 and lies buried beside the grave of his wife on the farm then owned by his son, Elisha about two miles south Ithaca and now owned by John Frazee (1906)". This family had actually visited the farm and burial site many years ago.

Also newspaper accounts from <u>Arcanum Times</u> dated May 1923 "grave located Frazee farm near Ithaca". And later in the <u>Arcanum Times</u> from May 10 1940 we read about the "Floyd farm adjacent to Darke-Preble Co. Line in Twin Twp. as the resting place."

Going back in time to the 1923's the Daughters of the American Revolution located the grave on the Frazee farm. A crude boulder with crude lettering and dates was the only marker found. A suitable monument was planned to be erected.

In 1940 a grave marking program was to be held at Ashley's gravesite under the Veterans Grave project-WPA- along with Ft. GreenVille Chapter DAR. The day of the ceremony the farmer or land owner changed his mind and the government grave marker was placed in Ithaca Cemetery.

In looking at the 1910 plat map you will see the Frazee farm at the corner of Rt. 503 and Darke Preble County Line Road. Not Clark Road as on an early map for Ashley Cemetery.

Fast forward, August 1, 2018 the Ft. GreenVille DAR Chapter re-dedicated the Ithaca stone. Jenny Quigney, Jim and Barb Deis and Annette Stewart attended the ceremony. Vicky Krogg, descendant of William Ashley family, was also present. Thru FB publicity of the event we found the owner of this location of supposed burial site. Jennifer Weaver Suggs mentions her dad living here for many years and moving a huge bolder on the farm to the pond area. So could this possibly be the bolder from 190 years ago marking patriot William's grave? But even if not the "actual" marker of the grave we are pretty certain William Ashley's remains are on this farm.

There are many records in AWTHS file on William Ashley and his family: Some are from Darke Genealogical Society, OH DAR, Vicky Krogg, Find a Grave and our local newspaper accounts. We can say William was a bricklayer by profession, had 11 children, served Revolutionary War on at least three accounts of service and migrated to Ohio from New York around 1816. In 1820 he was in Knox County, Ohio before coming to Twin Township.

Other Landmarks and Facts

William's sons were preachers or elders: William, Harry, Elder Elisha who later lived on William's farm and burial site; Elder Loami who married Jane Baker and built one of the oldest brick homes in Ithaca which is still standing today. It is located going north on Rt. 503 on the left (west) right by the Hoover home. Their initials were once visible in the south gable of the home. He was a bricklayer by trade. And Alanson, Sr. lived on Gordan-Landis Road near Darke-Preble County Line Road section 35 SE corner and would have been near the location of the church and Lynch Cemetery close to Oda's today. The Ashley's held Methodist meetings in his home in 1830 (Thomas Meeting House) and later per Gordon history this church went into town with the Baptist Church which later closed. We also read in another account: Alanson lived where Milbert Ressler and Bonnie Ressler lived -in 1985. Was also the Ed Boomershine farm.

If you access Find-a-Grave website you can read William's bio as well as mention of his family members and their prospective burial sites.

William is from Poultney VT and started his service in 1775.

He fought with the Green Mountain boys of VT and his father and HIS father's brothers are considered The Founders of Poultney VT.

<u>Baker Homes Story - Written by Bill Baker</u>

Is your DNA in this 1900 picture? Come find out at 9:00 AM Saturday, November 3, 2018 in Arcanum, Ohio. This picture, containing 400 to 500 people, was created at The Baker Reunion near Pitsburg, Ohio in 1900. The photo is on our FB page under the Baker Homes Event. We suggest you follow this event to keep updated.

The Arcanum Wayne Trail Historical Society, 123 West George Street, will feature pictures, relics and genealogy compiled by Bill and Jean Baker over thirty years. Bill Baker is a direct descendent of two lines of Baker pioneer families that settled much of west central Ohio. You also may be a descendent.

In 1805, the Michael Baker & Catherine Smucker Family arrived near (what would become) Brookville, Ohio. Henry Baker accompanied his uncle, Michael, from Somerset, Pennsylvania. Henry would marry Elizabeth Poe and from these two family roots, Baker pioneers and their relatives would settle much of the land between Brookville and Greenville, Ohio.

If your ancestor was living in 1900, there is a chance he or she is standing on the barn bank in the picture. Not everyone is named Baker. This is the only known print of the photograph that may have been taken by a newspaper photographer. Maybe you have the negative. Maybe you have a letter or article that references the reunion or the photo. Let's explore our Baker roots by focusing on the homes they made in The Miami Valley.

Join the search 9 AM to noon, Saturday, November 3, 2018 at the Arcanum Wayne Trail Historical Society, 123 West George Street, Arcanum, Darke County, Ohio.

You may be familiar with Dewey (milkman) and Grace Baker from Arcanum as we have a photo in our collection. This is one of many descendants from this family. If you have Fourman ties you're probably related!

Remembering When Making Apple Butter---taken from an old newspaper clipping, 1934

"Place, the home-like David Swinger farm, Franklin tp., Darke Co. The conserve maker – Mrs. Jesse W. Baker. Helpers- Betty, Paul, Shirl and Delbert Baker.

There is one savor of sweet cider and another of Rambeau apples ripening in orchard aisles. There is the piquancy of sorghum molasses bubbling in the pan and rapture of hickory wood burning in the open. There is the tang of rue and peppermint in old gardens, the smack of new mown corn and grain stacks drying. But the most wholesome of all these is the tantalizing aroma of homemade apple butter boiling in a great iron kettle.

Perhaps of all the settlements in the Miami Valley, the Pennsylvania Dutch of Franklin tp. Were the most famous for this conserve of sweet cider. Gallon after gallon of it boiled to almost the diminishing point before the choicest of ripe apples, peeled and quartered, were added as the final bouquet to make it a spread fit for royalty. From Mrs. Baker, descended from a long line of makers of endless jams, jellies and preserves, we learned the mysteries of open kettle-rendered apple butter.

But it takes work to make apple butter, and the sweet old-fashioned patience, possessed by very few now-adays, to stand over a kettle and stir and stir hour after hour. Mrs. Baker held a long pine stick in her hand and kept it busily turning. On the end of the stick a paddle attached, suspended and bored thick with holes explored every inch of the bubbling conserve, for if allowed to scorch just at the time it waxed sweetest and best, all her efforts would be for naught.

The way to know when it is done to perfection is by watching the bubbles, caused by the escaping steam, come more lazily to the top, and learned the psychological moment when the glowing ambers should be covered and the great pot of ambrosia left to cool. The cooled apple butter would be ladled out into stone crocks and jars, covered with paraffin and set in a sweet smelling cellar to make sandwich spread for the kiddies. Breathes there a man with stomach so papered he would not crave one of those sandwiches- golden apple butter spread thick over a base of country butter."
